Understanding the Seasons

What is the Epiphany?

Epiphany, or the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles, was, along with Easter and Pentecost, the third chief event or holy day in the calendar of the early Christian church. Coming on January 6, it climaxes not only the twelve days of the Christmas season, but also the whole cycle of expectation and celebration which began in Advent.

Though we associate it mainly now with the visit of the three Magi, its focus is actually much broader, celebrating all ways in which the Word is made flesh and Christ's glory is made manifest. Chief among these, besides the visit of the Magi, are Christ's baptism in the Jordan and his first miracle at Cana, as well as the image of Christ as light.

Much that we now associate with the celebration of the Christmas season was originally centered around Epiphany; Christmas came into being several centuries later, mainly in western Europe.

What is "Ordinary Time," anyway?

Ordinary Time is anything but ordinary! The term refers to the time between the two great feast cycles of the church: Advent/Christmas/Epiphany and Lent/Easter/Pentecost. The word "ordinary" is used because there is no one theme or special season observed during this time.

The UMW prepares two special worship services: Mission Sunday in and Harvest Home in November. The UMW monies are obtained through fundraisers. In 2016 the following fundraisers raised the noted amounts:

July—Three-night Bake Sale at the Grantville Volunteer Fire Company Carnival- \$900.75

September-Pretzel Sandwich Sale—\$207.30, November-Harvest Home—\$1,026

Others- Donations from members of the congregation and serving meals after funerals.

In May, the women's banquet is a time for fellowship with friends and family. This is not a fundraiser or are mission monies used. The cost of the tickets pays for the banquet. We have programs four times a year during meetings. Also attend district and Susquehanna conference meetings in different parts of the district/conference.

This year, we have supported the following: House of Hope- Home for troubled teenage girls and their families, \$800.00. In the future they wish to do the same for teenage boys. This is an annual commitment.

Father's Day-Hershey chocolate bars. (we discussed doing something else, but men wanted the chocolate).

Donation to GVFC-\$ 200, Donated 6 turkeys to Jo Kuhns for the track Thanksgiving dinner.

Mission Central mortgage-\$1,000.00 from the Harvest Home Offering.

We have met our commitment of \$520 with the district UMW.

November- World Thanks Offering is money each woman saves during the year and goes directly to the district in support of Missions-Required of each district unit.

Wesley Forest-\$150 towards volleyballs, basketballs, kickballs and electronic thermometers.

Ava Kawich-\$500, Lisha Robinson-\$250, Grantville Pantry-\$500 for a family that needed their van repaired

Other expenses, speakers- February and November, \$50 each.

God for Girls (teenage) and summer camps when requested.

Here are a couple of appetizer or "snack-type" foods to munch on while watching a football game or serve when friends drop by. The first is for a yummy cheese spread. I got this recipe from a good friend and co-worker of my years ago. She brought it to a work staff get-together once and after that people often requested it.

DENISE'S CHEESE SPREAD

1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup grated Swiss cheese
8 ounces softened cream cheese
Some chopped scallions

Mix the mayonnaise and cheeses together, sprinkle the scallions on top and bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Spread on crackers of your choice.

The next recipe comes from a very long time friend of mine. The two of us grew up in Ringtown and attended all twelve grades of school together. I went to visit her when we were all grown up and she served these delicious appetizers.

OLIVE APPETIZERS

¼ pound grated cheddar cheese
¼ cup butter
¾ cup flour

Blend these ingredients in a food processor.

1 8 ounce jar olives, drained and dried

Wrap each olive in the cheesy dough and roll in sesame seeds. Place on ungreased cookie sheet and bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes.
